Campaign Against Human Trafficking and Domestic Violence

CAHT is an all-volunteer, faith-based nonprofit whose vision is to improve the quality of life of our marginalized, struggling families and individuals in our neighborhoods in the South Shore area. We focus on the under belly of our communities' social issues by providing emergency safe shelter to traumatized individuals and families who seek a safe place to stay; education and prevention training about human trafficking and domestic violence that includes our puppet shows to elementary and junior high students on bullying; tangible items to victims of human trafficking and domestic abuse; scholarships; a school mentoring program; counseling for victims; and mental health workshops; rental and legal assistance; and activities that focus on our large Hispanic population's needs. In 2022, CAHT funded 133 individuals and families, handled over 77 referrals and sponsored 19 scholarships to deserving students, mostly from our Hispanic communities, who would not otherwise have been able to continue their educational dreams. Domestic violence and other forms of exploitation are on the rise in the South Shore area and is considered one of the root causes that leads to making teens and adults vulnerable to becoming human trafficking victims.

CAHT gives hope and compassion to those in need:

"The words from my phone calls with CAHT's Annie and Robbie echoed back to me with a sound of Love as I was touched within my heart in exultation. I consider my stay here at the hotel as a divine intervention to cross my path as I was almost in the streets the night before. My body froze as I was traveling to a safe place as a blessing and I was in tears, I was off the streets, safe and feeling that someone cared and was going to help me. I like to mention that I am a domestic violence abused wife for over a year now. I was beaten up many times by my husband, but this time he tried to kill me by beating me up with a baseball bat, I was on the floor as my husband called 911 and I was taken to the hospital while my husband was arrested for 1st degree attempted murder and is still in jail now. I was asked by our landlord to move out of our house as the rent was not paid and I became homeless and afraid. Thank you for your encouragement and helping destitute women like me who have experienced domestic

violence. I pray for God's Favor to be unleashed upon you all. Victim survivor - R. I."

From the Pastor's Desk...

Dear Church Family,

For years now, The United Methodist Church as a denomination has been discussing its future. [Particularly, regarding the church's position on Human Sexuality and LGBTQ inclusion.] Hardly a day goes by that someone doesn't ask me about things they have heard or read, and about churches who are currently leaving the denomination by disaffiliation.

I am planning to have several meetings to answer all questions you might have. I am going to call these meetings, Church Town Hall Meetings. The first Town Hall meeting will take place on January 9th at 6:30pm. Rev. Emily Hotho, our District Superintendent, will be here, and she and I will lead this meeting. No votes will be taken at this meeting.

The second meeting is planned for January 23rd at 6:30pm. At this meeting we will continue to look at our options as a congregation. More options will be presented, and questions will be addressed and answered. No votes will be taken at this meeting.

These are not meetings to debate or argue one's stance on LGBTQ issues. Rather, these meetings are specifically designed to address and answer questions regarding the future of the United Methodist Church as a denomination and our future as the United Methodist Church of Sun City Center. Our options as a congregation, to continue as United Methodists or to disaffiliate, will be presented and questions will be answered.

I will lead a third meeting, probably in late February or early March (date TBA), following my meeting with our new Bishop, Tom Berlin, on February 13th. It is my intention to remain neutral during these first two Church Town Hall meetings. At this third meeting I will share my personal thoughts, recommendations, and my heart as to where I believe God is leading us. We, as a congregation, will then enter a season of prayer and discernment over where God is leading us as a congregation. If we decide at that third meeting that we need to take a vote as a congregation regarding our future, another meeting will be set, and our District Superintendent will return to lead us through that process.

We will not be rushed through this process. We will be well informed before we make any decision. We will have spent much time in prayer. Our decisions will be informed and will be covered with prayer. These next few months and the decisions we make are monumental to our future. Therefore, I ask you to covenant with me to pray that whatever decision we make will be what God would have us do. If it is God's Will and Vision for us – we cannot fail. If it is not God's Will and Vision - we cannot succeed. For the sake of expediency, please get your questions to me before the meetings, so there will be ample time to address them.

Beloved, we are a part of a great church. I have assured you many times and will continue to assure you that my practice of ministry has not changed and will not change. My theology is not going to change. What we have been doing at UMCSCC has been working extremely well and God has truly blessed us. My heart tells me that YOU – the congregation that calls itself UMCSCC – wants us to move into the future doing exactly what we have been doing. I believe that is our goal as we work through this process. My personal Vision Statement for UMCSCC that I have centered my ministry around is, and has always been: To be a multigenerational, multi- ethnic, multi-cultural church that is Christ-focused in everything we do, to reach everyone within our sphere of ministry, bringing people into a personal relationship with Jesus and making disciples for the transformation of the world. I long for the day when we can put these discussions that separate us behind us and refocus all our efforts and energy on building the Kingdom of God. Thank you again for your prayers. I love you, Church Family.






From the Ledger – Dana Wallace

In November we received \$161,891 in income to offset \$127,424 in expenses. This leaves \$34,467 in income over expenses. Our budget anticipated \$222,673 in income or a shortfall to budget of \$60,782. Our year-to-date income is \$2,094,574 and our year-to-date expenses are \$2,504,491 which leaves us with \$407,917 in expenses over income this year to date. We had anticipated in our planning that we would have \$351 in expenses over income.

Our current mortgage balance is 1,814,706 down from 1,987,503 on January 1^{st} .

As the fourth quarter continues, with the return of many of our snowbirds and a very busy upcoming holiday season, we look forward to being able to balance the books as the year ends. Thank you in advance for your stewardship to your ministry. Also make sure that all contributions must be received prior to December 31 in order to be included in this year's giving summary. Additionally, make sure that we have your correct email address in our system because year end statements will be emailed again this year.


