GriefShare Begins In August

Healing From Loss is a Journey: *Everyone Experiences Grief Differently*

A new Grief Share session will begin on Wednesday, August 27th, from 6:30 PM –8:00 PM in room 19. This 13-week grief support group will be led by Pastor Debbie Marion, Minister of Pastoral Care, and focuses on important grief topics associated with the death of a loved one.

Weekly videos feature nationally respected grief experts and real-life stories of people, followed by a group discussion where confidentiality is key to this program.

Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing while friends or family members have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people tend to repress their grief and allow fear of what others may think keeping them from what could be helping them. Your bereavement experience may be recent, or not so recent. The hope is that you will find encouragement, comfort, and help in grieving the death of a spouse, child, sibling, other family members, or a friend. No matter what the cause of your loved one's death, this is an opportunity to be around people who understand what you are feeling. You will learn how to recognize the symptoms of being stuck in your grief and that you do not need to stay there. You will learn valuable information about dealing with the changes in your life and renewing your hope for the future. I hope you will consider being part of this valuable ministry.

Missions Update: Residing Hope

In 1896, the Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South made a resolution to establish a home for orphaned children in Florida. At the time, the Methodist churches of Florida were sending their orphaned children to the Methodist Orphan's Home in Macon, Georgia and providing funds to help support those children. At the 1899 Annual Conference, a committee was created to pursue the 1896 resolution (and, interestingly, to also consider how the church might help orphans in Cuba). In 1908, property was purchased in the town of Enterprise, FL overlooking Lake Monroe on the St. Johns River, and the Florida Methodist Children's Home was born. In 1909, to help ensure the success of the home, fifth Sundays were designated as "Orphanage Sundays" when special collections were made to support this important ministry.

Initially, the home served as an orphanage, admitting children between the ages of 2 and 14 who could remain there until the age of 18. The home also accepted children whose parents were still living but, for a variety of reasons, couldn't care for them. By the 1950s, more and more applications were being made for children in the latter category and, over time, the complexity of their needs greatly increased. Today, most of the children admitted have been in multiple foster situations where their foster families just weren't equipped to provide the level of care and attention these children need. As a result, the mission of the children's home has evolved significantly from just providing food, shelter and vocational training in a safe and nurturing space, to teaching basic social skills and providing counselling and intensive therapy for abused and extremely vulnerable children.



On May 22, six of us had the opportunity to visit the Children's Home to tour the facilities and speak with staff. We were so impressed with the incredible work being done to give hope to kids whose lives have left them feeling utterly hopeless. The children live in cottages with 6-8

children of their same age/gender and a house parent. Each child has a room and bathroom to him/herself. Part of their training is to learn to keep their individual spaces clean and to cooperate with others to keep the common spaces clean and tidy. They also have to learn things like: complying with directions; sitting at the table to eat with their housemates; accepting no for an answer; answering when spoken to; participating in conversation; etc.

The goal is for the children to be able to successfully be a part of a foster family and perhaps one day to be able to return to their own family. To reach this goal, each child has a list of the expected social behaviours and they're rewarded for consistently meeting those expectations. They not only earn special privileges, but also the respect and admiration of their peers. Additionally, the home has trained counsellors and therapists who can offer personalized and intensive therapy, as might be needed by each child. The facilities are amazing with: a beautiful chapel where the children can serve in the music ministry; an on-site school (for those who can't or don't want to attend the local public schools); a health clinic with nursing staff to administer medications; a beauty salon/barber shop where interested older children can also learn cosmetology; and a greenhouse and hydroponic garden where they can grow vegetables and then sell them at the local Farmer's Market. For fun and physical training, there's a high ropes course, an impressive climbing wall, a swimming pool, a gym, tennis courts and basketball courts.

Separate from the children, the Home offers independent living cottages for homeless young adults (aged 18-26) who need a stable place to stay while getting on their feet. These cottages have resident assistants, counsellors and therapists who all serve to support the residents as they learn to become independently functioning adults. There are scholarships available for those who wish to pursue their educations and transportation assistance for those who have jobs.

The Florida United Methodist Children's Home (now called Residing Hope) is an amazing ministry that gives children and young adults the hope of becoming healthy and contributing members of society. The staff are truly the hands and feet of Jesus to these extremely vulnerable individuals and we have the privilege of being able to support those hands and feet. The staff are so grateful for our financial contributions (Mission of the Month and 5th Sunday special offerings) that allow them to do this incredible work. Additionally, they've provided us with a list of practical contributions for both the children and the young adults (available in the office) including things such as bed linens, lip balm, gift cards, etc.
